Brethren,

June and July 1776 were busy months for those in Philadelphia and around the colonies. On 11 June, Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston were appointed to a committee to draft a declaration of independence. During June 12th to the 27th, Jefferson, at the request of the committee, drafts a declaration, of which only a fragment exists. Jefferson's clean, or "fair" copy, the



"original Rough draught," is reviewed by the committee. Both documents are in the manuscript collections of the Library of Congress. On June 28th the Congress debates and revises the Declaration of Independence. On July 2nd the Congress declares independence as the British fleet and army arrive at New York. On July 4th the Congress adopts the Declaration of Independence in the morning of a bright, sunny, but cool Philadelphia day. John Dunlap prints the Declaration of Independence. These prints are now called "Dunlap Broadsides." Twenty-four copies are known to exist, two of which are in the Library of Congress. One of these was Washington's personal copy. On July 5th John Hancock, president of the Continental Congress, dispatches the first of Dunlap's broadsides of the Declaration of Independence to the legislatures of New Jersey and Delaware. On July 6th the Pennsylvania Evening Post of July 6 prints the first newspaper rendition of the Declaration of Independence. July 8th was the first public reading of the Declaration is in Philadelphia. July 9th, George Washington orders that the Declaration of Independence be read before the American Army in New York.

While the fifty-six original signers did not all sign the Declaration on July 2nd they all eventually did and put their lives at risk as the English sought them out as traitors to the King and England.


The P.R.'s Corner Continued...

Lodge 120 (now San Francisco Lodge 120, where he served as Master in 1992. He affiliated with CA Lodge 1 in San Francisco and served as its Treasurer and Secretary. He also served as Inspector of the 163rd Masonic District for nine years; was a member of the Committee of Twenty and Annual Communication Activities Committee; director of the Acacia Creek and Nob Hill Masonic Center; and trustee of the California Masonic Homes (Union City and Covina), Masonic Foundation and Masonic Memorial Temple. He served as Senior Grand Steward in 1996/1997 under M:.W:. Allen B. Gresham and as Senior Grand Deacon in 2004/2005 under M:.W:. David R. Doan. M:.W:. Frank Loui was installed as Grand Master of Masons in California on September 25th, In the Scottish Rite Valley of San Francisco, he served as Vener-2011. able Master of the Lodge of Perfection and was coroneted with the 33rd degree Inspector General Honorary in 2003. He has served the Scottish Rite Valley of San Francisco as its Personal Representative, and General Secretary to the Sovereign Grand Inspector General in California, and is an affiliate member of the Oakland Scottish Rite Bodies. Illustrious Loui has presided over all three York Rite Bodies, and served the California Grand Council of Cryptic Masons as Grand Bible Bearer. He was appointed as Deputy of the Supreme Council for the Orient of California effective January 1, 2013. A member of Asiya Shrine, the Masonic Rosicrucian Society of the United States, National Sojourners - Golden Gate Chapter 18, and Heroes of '76. He served as President of the Golden Gate Masters and Past Masters Association, and the Chinese Acacia Club. Recognized for his service to Masonic Youth Groups, the Order of DeMolay presented him with their Honorary Legion of Honor. In community affairs, he serves with the Saint Monica men's Club and the San Francisco Chinatown Lions Club. 
