ARTHUR L. SALAZAR, JR Grand Master of Masons in California

Brother Arthur Lupe Salazar, Jr. is a past master of Irvine Valley Lodge No. 671 in Lake Forest and was the charter master of The Thirty-Three Lodge in Orange County. He received the Degrees of Masonry in San Francisco Lodge No. 120 in 2004 and was honored with the Hiram Award in 2012 by Irvine Valley Lodge No. 671.

An Orange County native, Brother Salazar is an accomplished Certified Public Accountant having practiced tax and accountancy for over 20 years. Most recently, he was owner and president of Salazar Accountancy Corporation. His career in public accounting began in Palo Alto before relocating back to Orange County in 2006. In 2020, he retired from public accounting and accepted the full-time role of Executive Vice President and Secretary of the California Scottish Rite Foundation. He received a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration from University of California Riverside, where he was an academic research scholar and a recipient of the A. Gary Anderson Special Achievement Award. He later earned a Master of Business Taxation from the University of Southern California.

Brother Salazar has acted in service and leadership to the Grand Lodge of California for eighteen years. He's served on several Grand Lodge committees including Annual Communication Activities, Audit, Inspector's Development, and the Joint Committee on Fraternal Relations. He has served as a consultant and a member to the Executive Committee, was a member of the Let's Write the Future Campaign committee and served on the Strategic Planning Group. He was an Inspector for five years and was elected Grand Treasurer in 2015 and served six terms in that role. Over that time, he served as Treasurer of Acacia Creek Retirement Communities, California Masonic Foundation, California Masonic Memorial Temple, Masonic Homes of California, and Nob Hill Masonic Center.

In addition, Brother Salazar has been active in many Masonic organizations and youth orders. He is a 33° Inspector General Honorary in the San Francisco Scottish Rite Valley and Orange County Scottish Rite Valley where he served as Treasurer and as Wise Master of the Chapter of Rose Croix. He was president of the Orange County Scottish Rite Foundation. He has served as Treasurer and Audit Committee chairman for the California Continued on next page

Scottish Rite Foundation. He is a member of the Orange County York Rite Bodies, El Bekal Shriners, Royal Order of Scotland, Saint Gabriel Conclave Red Cross of Constantine, and California College Societas Rosicruciana in Civitatibus Foederatis. He has been an adult volunteer for the International Order of Rainbow for Girls and DeMolay International, which bestowed upon him the Honorary Legion of Honor and made him a Deputy Member in 2022. And he is Chairman of the 2025 Conference of Grand Masters of Masons in North America.

An engaged member of his community, Brother Salazar volunteers as treasurer of the Youth Fund of Southern California. He was previously on the school site council for Oak Grove Elementary School, and he served as president of the school's foundation for six years. He has volunteered for the Red Cross of Orange County and the American Youth Soccer Association for which he served as a coach and referee. He and his family are members of Corpus Christi Catholic Church.

Brother Salazar is a proud husband and father. His wife of 24 years, Dr. Laura Camacho Salazar, is a physician in internal medicine. They have three children. The Jewish Kabbalah

The "Kabbalah," is a mystical and esoteric interpretation of Jewish teachings. Kabbalah explores the nature of God, the universe, and the soul, often through concepts like the Tree of Life, the Sefirot (divine attributes), and various meditative practices.

Three concepts to consider are "The Tree of Life", "The Zohar", and The Four Worlds".

The Tree of Life is a central symbol in Kabbalah, representing the structure of the universe and the relationship between God and creation. It consists of ten Sefirot (divine attributes or emanations) arranged in three columns. Here's a brief overview of the Sefirot:

- 1. Keter (Crown): Represents the divine will and unity with God.
- 2. Chokhmah (Wisdom): The initial point of creation, representing pure potential and insight.
- 3. Binah (Understanding): The process of discernment and analysis, allowing for the development of ideas.
- 4. Chesed (Kindness): Represents love, mercy, and the expansive force of creation.
- 5. Gevurah (Severity): Represents strength, discipline, and justice, providing balance to Chesed.
- 6. Tiferet (Beauty): Harmonizes the attributes of Chesed and Gevurah, symbolizing compassion and truth.
- 7. Netzach (Eternity): Represents endurance and the drive for achievement.
- 8. Hod (Glory): Symbolizes humility and the acknowledgment of the divine.
- 9. Yesod (Foundation): Acts as a connector, channeling the energies of the higher Sefirot into the physical world.
- 10. Malchut (Kingdom): Represents the material world and the manifestation of divine presence.

These Sefirot interact in various ways, reflecting different aspects of existence and spiritual growth. The Tree of Life serves as a guide for understanding the divine order and the journey of the soul.

The Zohar is one of the foundational texts of Kabbalah, often considered its most important work. Written in Aramaic and attributed to the second-century sage Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, it was actually composed in the late 13th century by the Spanish Jewish mystic Moses de Leon.

Key Aspects of the Zohar:

- 1. Mystical Interpretation: The Zohar provides deep, mystical interpretations of the Torah, exploring the hidden meanings behind the biblical text.
- 2. Structure: It consists of several volumes, with a narrative style that includes commentary on the Torah, parables, and discussions among various sages.

3. Themes:

Divine Nature: It delves into the nature of God, creation, and the relationship between the divine and humanity.

Sefirot and the Tree of Life: The Zohar elaborates on the Sefirot and how they interact, emphasizing the importance of these concepts in understanding spiritual reality.

Mystical Practices: It discusses meditative practices and the spiritual path, emphasizing the importance of intention and purity in one's spiritual pursuits.

- 4. Symbolism: The Zohar is rich in symbolism and uses metaphors to convey complex ideas about existence, the soul, and the divine.
- 5. Influence: The Zohar has profoundly influenced Jewish mysticism and has also impacted various philosophical and spiritual movements outside Judaism.

Overall, the Zohar is a key resource for those studying Kabbalah and seeking a deeper understanding of Jewish mystical

In Kabbalistic thought, the concept of the Four Worlds represents different levels of reality and consciousness through which divine energy flows. Each world corresponds to a different aspect of creation and spiritual experience.

Here's a brief overview of each:

1. Atzilut (Emanation):

Nature: The highest world, closest to the divine. It represents pure unity and the source of all creation.

Characteristics: Inhabitants of Atzilut are pure spiritual beings and include the highest Sefirot (Keter, Chokhmah, and Binah). It embodies divine will and essence.

2. Beriah (Creation):

Nature: The world of creation, where ideas and concepts take form. Characteristics: Associated with the intellect and the creation of the soul. The Sefirot of Beriah are primarily Chesed, Gevurah, and Tiferet. This world is where divine concepts begin to manifest.

3. Yetzirah (Formation):

Nature: The world of formation, where spiritual ideas are shaped into more concrete forms.

Characteristics: This world is associated with emotions and the formation of the soul. It includes the Sefirot of Netzach, Hod, and Yesod. Here, the spiritual begins to take on individual characteristics.

4. Asiyah (Action):

Nature: The lowest world, representing the physical universe and action. Characteristics: It includes the material realm and the practical application of spiritual concepts. The Sefirot of Malchut represents this world, where divine energy manifests in tangible forms.

Interconnectedness

The Four Worlds are interconnected, with each world influencing and reflecting the others. Spiritual practices in Kabbalah often aim to navigate these worlds, allowing practitioners to draw down divine energy and elevate their consciousness. You may study the Jewish Kabbalah in or library.
